■ From the Principal

Term 1 has been very successful so far, with students engaging effectively in their learning and classes running well at RHS. Our Year 9 students will attend their City Experiences next week, and after that, it's time for our Year 7 Camp. Both events promise to be very exciting and rewarding experiences for our students, and are only made possible through the hard work, commitment and creativity of our staff, in particular our sub-school teachers.

Our Year 12 English students are completing their first SAC (school-assessed coursework) – a creative response to Trevor Noah's book *Born a Crime: Stories from a South African Childhood* (2016). The feedback I have received so far in relation to this text study has been very positive, with many students reporting that this book was a great choice for study. A text like this one allows us to explore complex ideas, interesting writing and different perspectives on the world, adding richness and depth to the way we engage with other people and cultures.

On the topic of reading, our new teacher librarian, Mr Tiger Liu, is working closely with our team of English teachers to launch a new version of our reading program to students in Years 7 and 8, who will have regular opportunities to read in the library, supported through one-on-one conferences with Tiger or their English teacher. This is a very powerful, evidence-based approach to promoting great literacy skills through a love of reading for young people.

■ Victorian Mental Health Menu

A new initiative in 2023 for government schools in Victoria is the new Victorian Mental Health Menu for schools. This includes expanded funding for programs and staffing for schools, in order to provide 'targeted and more individualised support for students who need it' and to 'enable schools to intervene early to support students' (Department of Education 2023)

For us at RHS, this additional funding has allowed to employ more staff members in our Student Support team, which now includes our Counsellor, Youth Worker, Mental

Health Practitioner as well as our Family Liaison Officer. We are highly aware of the needs in this important area, as student health and wellbeing are crucial for success at school and the foundation for a happy, healthy life for our young people at RHS.
